FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT

Readings: Ezekiel 37:12–14 ; Romans 8:8–11 ; John 11:1–45

“COME OUT: FROM DEATH TO LIFE IN CHRIST”

Dear Brothers and Sisters, As we draw closer to Holy Week, the intensity of the Gospel deepens. The atmosphere surrounding Jesus becomes charged with tension, as His adversaries conspire against Him and the shadow of the Cross looms ever larger. **Yet, in the midst of this looming danger, Jesus performs one of His most profound signs: the raising of Lazarus. This act transcends the mere gift of physical life; it reveals the very essence of who Jesus is and invites us to reflect on our own journeys as we approach the final days of Lent. Standing before the tomb, Jesus boldly proclaims, “I am the resurrection and the life” [John 11:25]. This powerful declaration lies at the heart of today’s readings.**

God Brings Life Where There Is Death

The reading from Ezekiel paints a vivid picture of a people grappling with spiritual desolation. **Israel, burdened by exile and sin, envisions itself as a valley of dry bones. Yet God’s promise resonates: “I will open your graves and bring you back to life... I will put my spirit within you, and you shall live” [Ezekiel 37:12–14]. This prophecy finds fulfilment in the Gospel narrative, as Lazarus symbolises all of humanity trapped in the tombs of sin, fear, and despair. Saint Irenaeus of Lyons reminds us, “The glory of God is the human person fully alive.” God’s intention is not death or spiritual stagnation; rather, His desire is for us to experience life, full, abundant, and eternal. Lent serves as a poignant reminder that various burdens can gradually entomb us spiritually: resentment, habitual sin, discouragement, and complacency. Yet today, the Lord extends the same command He offered to Lazarus: “Come out.”**

Jesus Weeps with Us

One of the most profound moments in this Gospel is captured in the shortest verse of the Scriptures: *“Jesus wept”* [John 11:35]. Before demonstrating His power over death, **Jesus intimately shares in our sorrow. Christianity does not introduce us to a distant deity but a God who fully enters into human suffering.** Saint Augustine reflects, *“Christ wept as a man for Lazarus, and raised him as God.”* Jesus’ tears remind us that faith does not erase sorrow from our lives. **Christians continue to grieve, struggle, and confront death, yet we do so infused with hope. The raising of Lazarus assures us that death does not hold the final authority.**

Faith Begins Before the Miracle

Martha’s heartfelt declaration in the Gospel shines through as one of the most beautiful professions of faith: “Yes, Lord, I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God” [John 11:27]. **Notably, her faith precedes the miraculous moment when Lazarus steps out of the tomb. This sequence epitomises the Christian journey: faith first, understanding will follow.** Saint Gregory the Great eloquently stated, “Faith grows when it is lived.” Jesus poses a timeless question to Martha that resonates through the ages: *“Do you believe this?”* **This same question is directed to each of us as we navigate our own Lenten journey. Do we truly believe that Christ gives life?**

The Spirit Gives Life

In his poignant reflection, Saint Paul invites us to envision what this new life truly means: *“If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you... He will give life to your mortal bodies.”* [Romans

8:11] For Paul, resurrection isn't merely a future promise; it's a vibrant reality that begins right now through the Holy Spirit. When we live "*in the flesh*," we often find ourselves ensnared by selfish desires and ego. However, to live "*in the Spirit*" is to embody the essence of Christ; showing compassion, embodying truth, pursuing justice, practising generosity, and radiating love. Where the Spirit thrives, Christ flourishes.

"Untie Him and Let Him Go"

After Jesus raises Lazarus from the dead, he issues a powerful command: "Untie him and let him go." [John 11:44] **While Christ performs the miracle of resurrection, it's the community that assists in unbinding Lazarus from his grave clothes.** As Saint John Chrysostom insightfully noted, "*Christ gives life, but he entrusts to others the work of freeing those who are bound.*" This call rings true for us today. **Christ brings forth new life, but it's up to us to help one another shed the things that hold us captive: isolation, addiction, guilt, despair, and injustice.** The Christian community is meant to be a sanctuary where we actively support one another in reclaiming our freedom.

Baptism: Our Own Resurrection

The miracle of Lazarus also mirrors the transformative power of baptism, where each Christian partakes in Christ's triumph over death. Saint Ambrose beautifully articulates this journey: "In baptism, the tomb becomes a womb; the old person dies, and a new person is born." Through baptism, we initiate the journey of resurrection, but Lent calls us to introspect: **Is that life truly flourishing within us?**

A Call for the Final Days of Lent

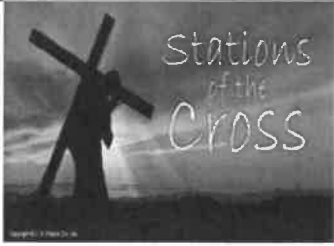
As Holy Week draws near, today's Gospel beckons us to examine our own lives. *What are the "tombs" that Christ longs to open for us? Where do we still feel shackled?* **The same Lord who stood before Lazarus' tomb stands at the entrance of our own, calling out with compassion and authority: "Come out."** The very power that resurrected Lazarus is the same divine force that will raise Jesus from the dead, and it dwells within every believer. Saint Paul reminds us: "It is no longer I who live, *but Christ who lives in me.*" [Galatians 2:20] May this final stretch of Lent inspire us to break free from our bonds, allowing the life of Christ to truly live, breathe, and shine vividly within us.

Prayer

Lord Jesus, you are the embodiment of resurrection and life. Call us forth from the tombs that ensnare our hearts. Fill us with your Spirit so we may walk as children of the light. As we approach Holy Week, fortify our faith, guiding us on the path from the Cross to the radiant glory of the Resurrection. Amen.

“What Do You Have in Your Hands?”

CHRISTIAN GIVING IS EUCHARISTIC

When the Lord asked Moses, “*What is that in your hand?*” [Exodus 4:2], **He invited Moses to recognise the power of what he already possessed.** The staff he carried, ordinary and shaped by daily life, became extraordinary when he returned it to God in trust. This poignant question resonates throughout Scripture and finds its deepest meaning in the Eucharist, whose very essence is thanksgiving.

Time and again, **God begins not with abundance, but with what is already held in grateful hands.** A widow may possess only a small jar of oil, yet when she offers it in faith, it never runs dry. A young boy provides five loaves and two fish, and in Jesus’ hands, they transform into nourishment for thousands. Another widow places two small coins into the temple treasury, and the Lord sees in her gift the fullness of a grateful heart. **In every instance, the gift may be small, yet the offering remains total. And in each case, thanksgiving unlocks God’s transformative power. This is the mystery we enter every time we approach the altar.**

The bread and wine we offer are described as the “**fruit of the earth and work of human hands.**” They gather the ordinary **substance of our lives; our labour, time, resources, joys, and struggles-** and present them before God in gratitude. As St. Irenaeus taught, in offering these gifts, the Church returns creation itself to the Creator with thanksgiving, and God responds by filling them with His divine life.

At the heart of the Eucharist stands Christ Himself, who takes, gives thanks, breaks, and distributes. Thanksgiving is not merely spoken; it is enacted. What is offered is not lost but transformed. What is broken is not destroyed but shared. St. Augustine reminds us that at the altar, we offer not just bread and wine, but ourselves. Our lives, like the staff of Moses, the oil of the widow, the loaves of the child, and the coins of the poor, are taken up into Christ’s perfect thanksgiving to the Father. This is why **Christian giving transcends mere practicality; it is Eucharistic. It flows from gratitude.** St. John Chrysostom teaches that true generosity is born when the heart recognises that all it possesses is a gift, and that nothing placed in God’s hands is ever wasted.

Each Eucharist gently asks us again: *What do you have in your hands today?* What we bring may appear small, but when offered in thanksgiving, it becomes united to Christ’s self-gift. In His hands, our humble offerings become blessings for many. May the Eucharist continually transform us into a people of thanksgiving; grateful in prayer, generous in providing, and confident that God can achieve more with our gifts than we can ever imagine.

IMPORTANT PARISH REMINDERS

The Sacrament of Baptism for Infants

Parents may contact the parish office to arrange for the baptism of their child at least one month in advance. Infant Baptisms are held on the third Sunday of the month at one of our weekend masses. Parents must be registered in Our Lady of Light or the parish they attend and participate in a Baptismal Preparation class.

Religious Education for Children and Youth:

Location and Times: Our Parish Faith Formation program takes place on Sunday mornings, in person this year. For more information, please contact , Deacon Marcial Cordon Director of Faith Formation, at 718 528-1220 or email at dre101269@diobrook.org

Ages and Requirements: Our program welcomes children and youth who are three years old through High School. We accept and prepare children and youth who have not received the Sacraments.

Parental Responsibilities: Our Holy Father, Pope Francis, reminds us in his new General Directory for Catechesis that those being catechized can live their life in a simple and spontaneous way. We are called to accompany each other on a journey toward Christ, with parents/guardians taking the lead for their children. In addition to having an active participation in the faith formation of their children, Parents or Guardians are also expected to attend Mass with their children and to attend parental preparations for Sacraments.

Reception of Sacraments for School Aged Children: Parents who would like for their child to receive the Sacraments must register them in our parish Sacramental Preparation Program. Our Program requires that children attend and prepare for two complete and consecutive academic years prior to the reception of each Sacrament. The Sacraments of Reconciliation and First Holy Communion is received beginning in grade 2 and up. The Sacrament of Confirmation requires attendance and preparation in our 2 year Confirmation Sacramental Preparation program. Confirmation preparation begins in grades 7 & 8. For each of the Sacraments, there is an extra fee, to cover the costs of the ceremonies. For more information, please contact, Deacon Marcial Cordon Director of Religious Education.

Reception of Sacraments for Adults (RCIA): Our Parish offers the RCIA program for those, ages 16 years and older, who are interested in becoming Catholic. It is also for those who have been baptized and in need of receiving the Sacraments of First Eucharist and Confirmation. The Rite of Christian Initiation program is offered year- round and is also available for children ages 8 and older through the Rite of Christian Initiation Adapted for Children program. Please contact Deacon Marcial Cordon , Director of Faith Formation to register or for more information.

Continuing Faith Formation for Adults: Our parish provides opportunities for lifelong faith formation through small faith sharing groups and bible studies. Please check our website, bulletin or contact the Faith Formation Office for more information.

The Sacrament of Marriage

Since Catholic marriage requires a time of preparation, arrangements should begin at least six months before the proposed date of the wedding to allow for the Marriage Preparation Program. Registered, participating and contributing parishioners, not a third party, may contact the parish office to begin the process.

Pastoral Care of the Sick

If you are entering a hospital for surgery, experiencing a prolonged or serious illness, or are very weak due to advancement of age, call the parish office to arrange for the Sacraments of reconciliation, communion and anointing at home. We can also arrange for a Eucharistic Minister to continue to visit you with the Blessed Sacrament. We are here to serve you, please call.

Funerals

The family member or friend handling the funeral arrangements are asked to contact the pastor to arrange a consolation visit from one of the Priests. He will help you with any questions you may have with planning the Wake and Funeral Mass. The Parish wishes to be with you at this moment of need, all other arrangements involving the church must be initiated by the funeral director. Proof of Parish Participation

References and proof of parish residency for both civil and religious purposes can only be provided for registered parishioners. Catholic Schools offering a discount for children of parents who are active members of their parish usually require that the family be registered at least six months previously in their home parish. It is also assumed that the children are registered in the religious education program of the home parish.
