DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY REFLECTION

Acts 2:42–47; 1 Peter 1:3–9; John 20:19–31

“ LIVING THE RISEN LIFE THROUGH DIVINE MERCY”

Dear Brothers and Sisters, on this Divine Mercy Sunday, the Church invites us to contemplate two inseparable mysteries: **the Resurrection of Jesus and the outpouring of His Divine Mercy**. As Saint John Paul II beautifully reminded us, this is the day when “divine mercy reaches us through the heart of Christ crucified.” **The wounds of Christ, still visible in His risen body, are not signs of defeat but rather the very channels through which mercy flows into the world.** The Gospel places us in the upper room, where fear had locked the doors of the disciples’ hearts: “the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear” [John 20:19]. **Into that fear, the Risen Lord enters; not by force, but with peace: “Peace be with you.” This is not merely a greeting; it is a gift.** As Saint Augustine reflects, “The peace of Christ is the tranquillity of order restored,” the healing of what sin has broken. **Mercy begins here: Christ does not reproach His disciples for abandoning Him; instead, He restores them.**

Mercy as New Creation

Then comes the astonishing moment: “*He breathed on them and said, ‘Receive the Holy Spirit’*” [John 20:22]. **Just as God breathed life into Adam [cf. Genesis 2:7], the Risen Christ breathes new life into His Church. The Church Fathers understood this act as the beginning of a new creation.** Saint Gregory the Great writes, “*As God once formed man from the dust, so now He reforms him through grace.*” **Divine Mercy is not only forgiveness; it is re-creation.** This gift is immediately entrusted with a mission: “*Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them*” [John 20:23]. **Mercy is not meant to be kept; it is meant to be shared. The Church becomes the living instrument of reconciliation, healing the wounds between God and humanity and among people themselves.** As Saint Faustina heard from the Lord: “*Be apostles of My mercy.*”

Mercy Lived in the Community

The First Reading shows us what this mercy looks like when lived out: “They devoted themselves to the apostles’ teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to the prayers” [Acts 2:42]. The early Christian community was marked by unity, generosity, and joy: “They broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts” [Acts 2:46]. No one was in need because love had become tangible.

This is the fruit of the Resurrection. The Risen Christ is not merely an idea; He is alive in a people transformed by mercy. Their life together became a powerful witness: “Day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved” [Acts 2:47]. As Tertullian famously pointed out, the world looked at Christians and said, “See how they love one another.” Yet, not everyone drew near. Some admired from a distance. The witness of mercy is attractive, but it also calls for conversion. This remains true today.

Faith That Endures

The Second Reading reminds us that this life of faith is not without trials: “By His great mercy, He has given us a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead” [1 Peter 1:3]. Saint Peter speaks of a hope that endures even through suffering: “Although now for a little while you may have to suffer various trials” [1 Peter 1:6]. Faith, he says, is more precious than gold.

Mercy does not remove all difficulties, but it gives meaning and strength within them. It anchors us in the risen life of Christ.

From Doubt to Faith: Embracing the Journey

In the story of Thomas, we meet the honest doubter, a figure who reflects our deepest human desires for certainty and proof. *“Unless I see... I will not believe”* [John 20:25]. **Yet, in that moment of doubt, he encounters the Risen Lord, and everything shifts. Thomas transcends mere evidence to make one of the most profound confessions in the Gospel: “My Lord and my God!”** [John 20:28]. Saint Gregory the Great noted, *“The disbelief of Thomas has done more for our faith than the faith of the other disciples.”* Through Thomas’s doubt, we are beckoned into a more intimate and personal faith journey. Jesus reminds us, *“Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe”* [John 20:29]. **Today, we encounter Him in the sacraments, within our community, and in acts of suffering. Saint John Chrysostom reminds us that we touch Christ’s wounds whenever we serve the poor and the afflicted.**

Living Mercy Today at Our Lady of Light

Divine Mercy Sunday is a call to action for each one of us at Our Lady of Light Parish. It’s a chance to bring the beauty of Easter into our everyday lives.

To Our Youth:

Let go of any fear surrounding your faith or your doubts. Like Thomas, bring your questions directly to Jesus. He embraces those who genuinely seek. Let your lives shine as bold witnesses of mercy through acts of kindness, forgiveness, and standing firm for what is right. The world is in dire need of your faith, your energy, and your hope!

To Our Elders:

Your faith, honed through years of trial and perseverance, is a priceless treasure for our community. Like the early disciples, continue to exemplify resilience and trust. Your prayers, wisdom, and quiet acts of mercy nourish this parish in ways you may not even realise. Your legacy is a light for others to follow.

To All of Us:

We are summoned to create a community where *“no one was in need”* [Acts 4:34], a space where forgiveness is genuinely practised and peace replaces fear. Building such a community through sharing, compassion, and reconciliation is a powerful testament to Christ’s resurrection and presence among us.

Receiving, Believing, Becoming Mercy

Divine Mercy Sunday invites us to embrace three vital responses:

- ☐ **To receive mercy** – Trust that no sin is beyond Christ’s boundless love.
- ☐ **To believe** – Hold tight to the living hope of the Resurrection, which transforms our lives.
- ☐ **To become mercy** – Act as instruments of reconciliation and peace in our world.

When we embody these responses, Easter transcends being just a historical event; it becomes a vibrant, living reality within us. May we echo Thomas’s heartfelt declaration with conviction and love: “My Lord and my God!” May our faith overflow into lives marked by mercy. Amen.

“What Do You Have in Your Hands?”

CHRISTIAN GIVING IS EUCHARISTIC

When the Lord asked Moses, “*What is that in your hand?*” [Exodus 4:2], **He invited Moses to recognise the power of what he already possessed.** The staff he carried, ordinary and shaped by daily life, became extraordinary when he returned it to God in trust. This poignant question resonates throughout Scripture and finds its deepest meaning in the Eucharist, whose very essence is thanksgiving.

Time and again, **God begins not with abundance, but with what is already held in grateful hands.** A widow may possess only a small jar of oil, yet when she offers it in faith, it never runs dry. A young boy provides five loaves and two fish, and in Jesus’ hands, they transform into nourishment for thousands. Another widow places two small coins into the temple treasury, and the Lord sees in her gift the fullness of a grateful heart. **In every instance, the gift may be small, yet the offering remains total. And in each case, thanksgiving unlocks God’s transformative power. This is the mystery we enter every time we approach the altar.**

The bread and wine we offer are described as the “**fruit of the earth and work of human hands.**” They gather the ordinary **substance of our lives; our labour, time, resources, joys, and struggles-** and present them before God in gratitude. As St. Irenaeus taught, in offering these gifts, the Church returns creation itself to the Creator with thanksgiving, and God responds by filling them with His divine life.

At the heart of the Eucharist stands Christ Himself, who takes, gives thanks, breaks, and distributes. Thanksgiving is not merely spoken; it is enacted. What is offered is not lost but transformed. What is broken is not destroyed but shared. St. Augustine reminds us that at the altar, we offer not just bread and wine, but ourselves. Our lives, like the staff of Moses, the oil of the widow, the loaves of the child, and the coins of the poor, are taken up into Christ’s perfect thanksgiving to the Father. This is why **Christian giving transcends mere practicality; it is Eucharistic. It flows from gratitude.** St. John Chrysostom teaches that true generosity is born when the heart recognises that all it possesses is a gift, and that nothing placed in God’s hands is ever wasted.

Each Eucharist gently asks us again: *What do you have in your hands today?* What we bring may appear small, but when offered in thanksgiving, it becomes united to Christ’s self-gift. In His hands, our humble offerings become blessings for many. May the Eucharist continually transform us into a people of thanksgiving; grateful in prayer, generous in providing, and confident that God can achieve more with our gifts than we can ever imagine.

IMPORTANT PARISH REMINDERS

The Sacrament of Baptism for Infants

Parents may contact the parish office to arrange for the baptism of their child at least one month in advance. Infant Baptisms are held on the third Sunday of the month at one of our weekend masses. Parents must be registered in Our Lady of Light or the parish they attend and participate in a Baptismal Preparation class.

Religious Education for Children and Youth:

Location and Times: Our Parish Faith Formation program takes place on Sunday mornings, in person this year. For more information, please contact , Deacon Marcial Cordon

Ages and Requirements: Our program welcomes children and youth who are three years old through High School. We accept and prepare children and youth who have not received the Sacraments.

Parental Responsibilities: Our Holy Father, Pope Francis, reminds us in his new General Directory for Catechesis that those being catechized can live their life in a simple and spontaneous way. We are called to accompany each other on a journey toward Christ, with parents/guardians taking the lead for their children. In addition to having an active participation in the faith formation of their children, Parents or Guardians are also expected to attend Mass with their children and to attend parental preparations for Sacraments.

Reception of Sacraments for School Aged Children: Parents who would like for their child to receive the Sacraments must register them in our parish Sacramental Preparation Program. Our Program requires that children attend and prepare for two complete and consecutive academic years prior to the reception of each Sacrament. The Sacraments of Reconciliation and First Holy Communion is received beginning in grade 2 and up. The Sacrament of Confirmation requires attendance and preparation in our 2 year Confirmation Sacramental Preparation program. Confirmation preparation begins in grades 7 & 8. For each of the Sacraments, there is an extra fee, to cover the costs of the ceremonies. For more information, please contact, Deacon Marcial Cordon Director of Religious Education.

Reception of Sacraments for Adults (RCIA): Our Parish offers the RCIA program for those, ages 16 years and older, who are interested in becoming Catholic. It is also for those who have been baptized and in need of receiving the Sacraments of First Eucharist and Confirmation. The Rite of Christian Initiation program is offered year- round and is also available for children ages 8 and older through the Rite of Christian Initiation Adapted for Children program. Please contact Deacon Marcial Cordon , Director of Faith Formation to register or for more information.

Continuing Faith Formation for Adults: Our parish provides opportunities for lifelong faith formation through small faith sharing groups and bible studies. Please check our website, bulletin or contact the Faith Formation Office for more information.

The Sacrament of Marriage

Since Catholic marriage requires a time of preparation, arrangements should begin at least six months before the proposed date of the wedding to allow for the Marriage Preparation Program. Registered, participating and contributing parishioners, not a third party, may contact the parish office to begin the process.

Pastoral Care of the Sick

If you are entering a hospital for surgery, experiencing a prolonged or serious illness, or are very weak due to advancement of age, call the parish office to arrange for the Sacraments of reconciliation, communion and anointing at home. We can also arrange for a Eucharistic Minister to continue to visit you with the Blessed Sacrament. We are here to serve you, please call.

Funerals

The family member or friend handling the funeral arrangements are asked to contact the pastor to arrange a consolation visit from one of the Priests. He will help you with any questions you may have with planning the Wake and Funeral Mass. The Parish wishes to be with you at this moment of need, all other arrangements involving the church must be initiated by the funeral director. Strict adherence to the Roman Catholic Ritual for Funerals will be followed in all parish involved activities..

Proof of Parish Participation

References and proof of parish residency for both civil and religious purposes can only be provided for registered parishioners. Catholic Schools offering a discount for children of parents who are active members of their parish usually require that the family be registered at least six months previously in their home parish. It is also assumed that the children are registered in the religious education program of the home parish.
