THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER

Luke 24:13–35

STAY WITH US, LORD AND BREAKING OF BREAD

The Road We All Walk

On that first Easter Sunday, two disciples walked away from Jerusalem, away from hope, away from community, and what they believed had failed. Their expectations of Jesus as a *certain kind* of Messiah had been shattered: “*We had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel.*” [Luke 24:21] That “hope” was real but limited. They envisioned a Messiah on their own terms, and when reality did not match their expectations, disappointment set in. **Like them, we often walk roads shaped by our assumptions of how God should act. When those expectations crumble, it can cloud our vision and prevent us from seeing what God is truly doing. Yet this Gospel reveals a profound truth: even in our moments of departure, the Risen Lord walks alongside us. “I am the way, and the truth, and the life.”** [John 14:6]

The Stranger Who Walks Beside Us

The disciples did not recognise Jesus, because their expectations prevented them from seeing Him. “*Their eyes were kept from recognising him.*” [Luke 24:16] Their image of the Messiah had been shattered, and that very disappointment became a barrier to encounter. How often does this happen to us? We can become close-minded, “*I already know,*” or “*this is how it has always been done.*” Such attitudes quietly resist the movement of the Spirit. St. Augustine reminds us: “*It was not that Christ was absent, but that their eyes were not yet able to recognise Him.*” And yet, **everything begins to change when they remain open, when they share their story, when they listen, and when they extend hospitality: “Stay with us, for it is nearly evening.”** [Luke 24:29] **Their openness to the “stranger” becomes the very place of encounter. The one they invite in is the Lord they had been lamenting, the Teacher they most needed.**

The Hearts Burned within as the Word was shared

Before their eyes are opened, their hearts are already being transformed: “*Were not our hearts burning within us while he spoke to us on the way and opened the scriptures to us?*” [Luke 24:32]. **Jesus does not simply comfort them; He reinterprets their entire understanding. Through the Scriptures, He reveals that the Messiah must suffer, that the Cross was not failure but fulfilment. This requires humility, the willingness to let go of what we think we know to receive what God reveals.** St. Jerome teaches: “*Ignorance of Scripture is ignorance of Christ.*” The disciples begin to move from confusion to understanding, from disappointment to renewed longing. Their hearts burn because the Spirit is opening them to a deeper truth.

The Breaking of the Bread

Recognition comes in a familiar yet transformed moment: “*He took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened.*” [Luke 24:30–31] **The same Jesus they failed to recognise on the road is now unmistakably present in the breaking of the bread. This is the Eucharist, the privileged place of encounter.** But this Gospel also challenges us: *how often do we approach the Eucharist routinely, casually, on our own terms? How often do we miss the living encounter with the Lord’s passion and self-giving love?* **The disciples, once opened by the Word and receptive to the Spirit, longed for His presence: “Stay with us.” That longing led them to the**

table, and there, they truly saw. St. John Chrysostom reminds us: “*Do you wish to honour the body of Christ? Do not ignore Him when He is naked...*” The Eucharist is never isolated; it sends us into love, into service, into real communion.

From Disappointment to Mission: A Spirit-Led Transformation

The transformation of the Emmaus disciples mirrors the transformation of the Apostles themselves. At first, they were fearful, confused, and disillusioned. But when they allowed themselves to be truly encountered by the Risen Lord, when they received His Spirit, when their minds were enlightened through the Scriptures, they were changed. They became courageous proclaimers of the Gospel. So too with the two disciples: their encounter leads to immediate action: “They set out that same hour and returned to Jerusalem.” [Luke 24:33] **They turn around. This is a conversion. Their shattered hopes are not simply restored; they are transformed. They now understand Jesus not according to their expectations, but according to God’s plan.** This is the work of the Holy Spirit: Breaking open our limited visions; Freeing us from rigid thinking [“*I know it all,*” “*it has always been this way*”] and leading us into living encounter.

The Pattern of the Christian Life

The Emmaus story illustrates the complete pattern of Christian life and worship:

- In **Gathering**: We walk together with our struggles and questions.
- In the **Word**: Christ enlightens us through Scripture.
- At **Table**: We recognise Him in the Eucharist.
- In the **Mission**: We return to share the Good News.

This narrative also serves as a call for ongoing openness; to the Spirit, to Scripture, to one another, and to the unexpected ways in which Christ meets us.

Do Not Miss the Encounter

In conclusion, **the greatest danger is not that Christ is absent; rather, it is that we remain closed off. We might be closed due to disappointment, rigid expectations, or the monotony of routine. However, when we open ourselves: when we listen, welcome, and allow the Spirit to guide us, everything changes. The disciples invited a stranger in and discovered the Lord. They listened with open hearts and were ignited with passion. They broke bread and truly saw Him.**

May we have the grace to let go of our limited expectations, remain open to the Spirit’s guidance, encounter Christ in the Word and the Eucharist, and become, like the Apostles, courageous witnesses of His Resurrection.

“Stay with us, Lord.” May we recognise Him when He does.

“What Do You Have in Your Hands?”

CHRISTIAN GIVING IS EUCHARISTIC

When the Lord asked Moses, “*What is that in your hand?*” [Exodus 4:2], **He invited Moses to recognise the power of what he already possessed.** The staff he carried, ordinary and shaped by daily life, became extraordinary when he returned it to God in trust. This poignant question resonates throughout Scripture and finds its deepest meaning in the Eucharist, whose very essence is thanksgiving.

Time and again, **God begins not with abundance, but with what is already held in grateful hands.** A widow may possess only a small jar of oil, yet when she offers it in faith, it never runs dry. A young boy provides five loaves and two fish, and in Jesus’ hands, they transform into nourishment for thousands. Another widow places two small coins into the temple treasury, and the Lord sees in her gift the fullness of a grateful heart. **In every instance, the gift may be small, yet the offering remains total. And in each case, thanksgiving unlocks God’s transformative power. This is the mystery we enter every time we approach the altar.**

The bread and wine we offer are described as the “**fruit of the earth and work of human hands.**” They gather the ordinary substance of our lives; our labour, time, resources, joys, and struggles- and present them before God in gratitude. As St. Irenaeus taught, in offering these gifts, the Church returns creation itself to the Creator with thanksgiving, and God responds by filling them with His divine life.

At the heart of the Eucharist stands Christ Himself, who takes, gives thanks, breaks, and distributes. Thanksgiving is not merely spoken; it is enacted. What is offered is not lost but transformed. What is broken is not destroyed but shared. St. Augustine reminds us that at the altar, we offer not just bread and wine, but ourselves. Our lives, like the staff of Moses, the oil of the widow, the loaves of the child, and the coins of the poor, are taken up into Christ’s perfect thanksgiving to the Father. This is why **Christian giving transcends mere practicality; it is Eucharistic. It flows from gratitude.** St. John Chrysostom teaches that true generosity is born when the heart recognises that all it possesses is a gift, and that nothing placed in God’s hands is ever wasted.

Each Eucharist gently asks us again: *What do you have in your hands today?* What we bring may appear small, but when offered in thanksgiving, it becomes united to Christ’s self-gift. In His hands, our humble offerings become blessings for many. May the Eucharist continually transform us into a people of thanksgiving; grateful in prayer, generous in providing, and confident that God can achieve more with our gifts than we can ever imagine.

IMPORTANT PARISH REMINDERS

The Sacrament of Baptism for Infants

Parents may contact the parish office to arrange for the baptism of their child at least one month in advance. Infant Baptisms are held on the third Sunday of the month at one of our weekend masses. Parents must be registered in Our Lady of Light or the parish they attend and participate in a Baptismal Preparation class.

Religious Education for Children and Youth:

Location and Times: Our Parish Faith Formation program takes place on Sunday mornings, in person this year. For more information, please contact , Deacon Marcial Cordon Director of Faith Formation, at 718 528-1220 or email at dre101269@diobrook.org

Ages and Requirements: Our program welcomes children and youth who are three years old through High School. We accept and prepare children and youth who have not received the Sacraments.

Parental Responsibilities: Our Holy Father, Pope Francis, reminds us in his new General Directory for Catechesis that those being catechized can live their life in a simple and spontaneous way. We are called to accompany each other on a journey toward Christ, with parents/guardians taking the lead for their children. In addition to having an active participation in the faith formation of their children, Parents or Guardians are also expected to attend Mass with their children and to attend parental preparations for Sacraments.

Reception of Sacraments for School Aged Children: Parents who would like for their child to receive the Sacraments must register them in our parish Sacramental Preparation Program. Our Program requires that children attend and prepare for two complete and consecutive academic years prior to the reception of each Sacrament. The Sacraments of Reconciliation and First Holy Communion is received beginning in grade 2 and up. The Sacrament of Confirmation requires attendance and preparation in our 2 year Confirmation Sacramental Preparation program. Confirmation preparation begins in grades 7 & 8. For each of the Sacraments, there is an extra fee, to cover the costs of the ceremonies. For more information, please contact, Deacon Marcial Cordon Director of Religious Education.

Reception of Sacraments for Adults (RCIA): Our Parish offers the RCIA program for those, ages 16 years and older, who are interested in becoming Catholic. It is also for those who have been baptized and in need of receiving the Sacraments of First Eucharist and Confirmation. The Rite of Christian Initiation program is offered year- round and is also available for children ages 8 and older through the Rite of Christian Initiation Adapted for Children program. Please contact Deacon Marcial Cordon , Director of Faith Formation to register or for more information.

Continuing Faith Formation for Adults: Our parish provides opportunities for lifelong faith formation through small faith sharing groups and bible studies. Please check our website, bulletin or contact the Faith Formation Office for more information.

The Sacrament of Marriage

Since Catholic marriage requires a time of preparation, arrangements should begin at least six months before the proposed date of the wedding to allow for the Marriage Preparation Program. Registered, participating and contributing parishioners, not a third party, may contact the parish office to begin the process.

Pastoral Care of the Sick

If you are entering a hospital for surgery, experiencing a prolonged or serious illness, or are very weak due to advancement of age, call the parish office to arrange for the Sacraments of reconciliation, communion and anointing at home. We can also arrange for a Eucharistic Minister to continue to visit you with the Blessed Sacrament. We are here to serve you, please call.

Funerals

The family member or friend handling the funeral arrangements are asked to contact the pastor to arrange a consolation visit from one of the Priests. He will help you with any questions you may have with planning the Wake and Funeral Mass. The Parish wishes to be with you at this moment of need, all other arrangements involving the church must be initiated by the funeral director. Strict adherence to the Roman Catholic Ritual for Funerals will be followed in all parish involved activities..

Proof of Parish Participation

References and proof of parish residency for both civil and religious purposes can only be provided for registered parishioners. Catholic Schools offering a discount for children of parents who are active members of their parish usually require that the family be registered at least six months previously in their home parish. It is also assumed that the children are registered in the religious education program of the home parish.
