ASCENSION SUNDAY AND THE MEMORIAL OF ST. PASCAL BAYLON

Readings: Acts 1: 1-11; Ephesians 1:17-23; Mathew 28:16-20

“WHY DO YOU STAND LOOKING UP?”

CHRIST ASCENDED, CHRIST PRESENT, CHRIST ADORED

Dear Our Lady of Light family, The Feast of the Ascension invites us to reflect on a profound truth: while it might seem like Jesus has left us, the reality is much different. As the disciples watched Him ascend into the sky, they couldn't help but gaze upward in wonder. But the angels had an insightful question for them: *“Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up toward heaven?”* [Acts 1:11]. This question reminds us that we shouldn't search for Christ at a distance. The Ascended Lord is not absent; He is present with us in a new and deeper way. His presence permeates our lives through the Holy Spirit, within the Church, among the marginalised and forgotten, and especially in the celebration of the Holy Eucharist. This connection beautifully echoes the life of one of our cherished patrons, St. Pascal Baylon.

A Celebration of Presence, Not Distance

The Ascension isn't about Jesus floating away into some distant space; instead, it portrays heaven as a dynamic communion with the Father. In this event, Jesus fully embraces the glory of God, yet He remains deeply engaged with our world. In today's Gospel, He reassures us with a powerful promise: *“And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age”* [Matt 28:20]. The Risen Lord is alive and present wherever His Spirit thrives—where mercy overcomes hatred, where truth and justice take a stand, and where we gather to break bread and share the Eucharist.

St. Augustine captured this sentiment beautifully when he said, *“Christ ascended before the eyes of the disciples, and they turned back grieving only because they had not yet understood that He had not left them.”* The Ascension, then, isn't a farewell but rather a powerful commissioning. Jesus entrusts His mission to ordinary disciples—like you and me—and sends us out into the world to carry His message of love, hope, and redemption. So, as we celebrate the Feast of the Ascension, let us embrace our role in this ongoing mission, remembering that we are never alone. The presence of Christ is always with us as we navigate our lives together.

St. Pascal Baylon: A Journey to Heaven Through the Eucharist

St. Pascal Baylon had a profound understanding of a mystical truth: **true divinity is often found in the simplicity of ordinary life. Rather than searching for God in extraordinary events or distant places, he discovered Christ intimately present in the Blessed Sacrament, during heartfelt prayers, honest labour, and acts of humble service.** As a young shepherd, Pascal was recognised for his unwavering honesty and sense of justice. If his sheep strayed and damaged a neighbour's crops, he insisted on making amends. Even as a child, he would quietly take moments from his daily duties to pray in the village church. In our bustling lives today, especially here in Queens, his example speaks to us. In a city filled with noise, deadlines, and distractions, **St. Pascal reminds us that holiness often begins in the small, faithful acts of our everyday lives; whether it's practising fairness in business, extending kindness to neighbours, being honest at work, or dedicating time to worship.**

When Pascal joined the Franciscans, he chose the path of a lay brother rather than that of a priest. Embracing the beauty of a hidden life, **he committed himself to cleaning, cooking, serving,**

carrying burdens, and fervent prayer. Yet through it all, his greatest love remained the Eucharist. Time and again, he would spend long hours in adoration before the Blessed Sacrament, passionately defending the Real Presence of Christ against those who doubted it. Tradition tells us he was graced with visions of Christ in the monstrance, surrounded by angels, a powerful reminder that the glory of the Ascended Christ is ever-present in the heart of the Eucharist.

"The Work of Human Hands"

Every presentation of gifts at Mass begins with a beautiful proclamation: *"Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation, for through your goodness we have received the bread we offer you: fruit of the earth and work of human hands."* How fitting that this sentiment resonates deeply in Queens, [New York], **a vibrant community built on the hard work and dedication of immigrants, families, delivery drivers, nurses, teachers, construction workers, cleaners, cooks, and caretakers. Here, Jesus elevates the ordinary: bread, wine, human labour, and daily sacrifices to holy status. The Ascended Christ continues to sanctify our world through these humble means.** As St. Irenaeus beautifully expressed, *"The bread, receiving the Word of God, becomes the Eucharist, the Body of Christ."* This reminds us that God treasures the ordinary and transforms it into something extraordinary. In today's world, what we truly need are not people gazing at the heavens while neglecting the suffering around them, but rather disciples who recognise Christ's presence in the Eucharist, in the faces of the poor, the exhausted parents, the lonely elderly, the struggling immigrants, and the children searching for hope.

"I Am Yours"

One of the most beautiful prayers associated with St. Pascal Baylon is a simple, yet powerful declaration: **"I am yours, Lord."** **Could we echo this sentiment today, not just with words, but in the depths of our lives? "Lord, my work is yours." "My family is yours." "My struggles are yours." "My future is yours." "My heart is yours."** The Ascension serves as a reminder that while Christ reigns in glory, He also remains with us, waiting humbly in the Eucharist; silent and hidden beneath the appearances of bread and wine.

Sent Forth, Not Left Behind

At the conclusion of the Gospel, Jesus sends His disciples out with a clarion call: *"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations."* **The disciples couldn't remain passively gazing upwards, and neither can we. Inspired by the example and prayers of St. Pascal Baylon, our parish community is called to be a beacon of Eucharistic faith, a place of welcome and healing where Christ is both recognised and adored.**

If St. Pascal teaches us anything, it's that those who kneel longest before the Eucharist often emerge as the most generous servants to others. As we celebrate this feast of Ascension, let our hearts soar toward heaven, not as a means to escape the world, but to encounter Christ alive and well within it. Through the intercession of St. Pascal Baylon, may we become a truly Eucharistic people who can lovingly proclaim: **"Jesus, I am yours."**

OUR IDENTITY IN THREE NAMES

Dear brothers and sisters of Our Lady of Light, it's crucial to remember our identity as a parish community and the meaning of our patron saints. Names hold profound significance; they embody our history, belonging, and mission. In families, names often connect us to our heritage, embody cherished values, or honour ancestors. They declare, **"You belong to something greater."**

In Scripture, when God changes a name, it marks a transformation in identity and purpose: Abram becomes Abraham, the father of nations; Simon becomes Peter, the foundation of the Church. These shifts highlight a vital truth: God's call is an invitation to a new identity. God knows us personally: "I have called you by name, you are mine" [Isaiah 43:1]. **Your name and life are significant; you are known, loved, and sent.**

From the early Church, Christians named children after saints for spiritual protection and inspiration. The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches that a patron saint models charity and provides intercession (CCC 2156).

- We are under their spiritual guidance.
- We strive to reflect their virtues.
- We unite with the communion of saints.

As Hebrews 12:1 reminds us, "we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses." **The saints are not distant; they accompany us on our journey of faith.**

Our Lady of Light — Leads to Christ: Mary guides us to Jesus, the Light. *"Do whatever He tells you."* [John 2:5] We are called to walk in His light and share it.

St. Catherine of Siena — Living the Truth: A witness of courage, prayer, and love for the Church. We are called to stand firm in faith, speak truth with love, and live deeply in prayer.

St. Pascal Baylon — Loving the Eucharist: A humble servant devoted to Christ in the Eucharist. We are called to love the Eucharist, live humbly, and find holiness in daily life.

"What Do You Have in Your Hands?"

CHRISTIAN GIVING IS EUCHARISTIC

When the Lord asked Moses, "*What is that in your hand?*" [Exodus 4:2], **He invited Moses to recognise the power of what he already possessed.** The staff he carried, ordinary and shaped by daily life, became extraordinary when he returned it to God in trust. This poignant question resonates throughout Scripture and finds its deepest meaning in the Eucharist, whose very essence is thanksgiving.

Time and again, **God begins not with abundance, but with what is already held in grateful hands.** A widow may possess only a small jar of oil, yet when she offers it in faith, it never runs dry. A young boy provides five loaves and two fish, and in Jesus' hands, they transform into nourishment for thousands. Another widow places two small coins into the temple treasury, and the Lord sees in her gift the fullness of a grateful heart. **In every instance, the gift may be small, yet the offering remains total. And in each case, thanksgiving unlocks God's transformative power. This is the mystery we enter every time we approach the altar.**

The bread and wine we offer are described as the "**fruit of the earth and work of human hands.**" They gather the ordinary substance of our lives; our labour, time, resources, joys, and struggles- and present them before God in gratitude. As St. Irenaeus taught, in offering these gifts, the Church returns creation itself to the Creator with thanksgiving, and God responds by filling them with His divine life.

At the heart of the Eucharist stands Christ Himself, who takes, gives thanks, breaks, and distributes. Thanksgiving is not merely spoken; it is enacted. What is offered is not lost but transformed. What is broken is not destroyed but shared. St. Augustine reminds us that at the altar, we offer not just bread and wine, but ourselves. Our lives, like the staff of Moses, the oil of the widow, the loaves of the child, and the coins of the poor, are taken up into Christ's perfect thanksgiving to the Father. This is why **Christian giving transcends mere practicality; it is Eucharistic. It flows from gratitude.** St. John Chrysostom teaches that true generosity is born when the heart recognises that all it possesses is a gift, and that nothing placed in God's hands is ever wasted.

Each Eucharist gently asks us again: *What do you have in your hands today?* What we bring may appear small, but when offered in thanksgiving, it becomes united to Christ's self-gift. In His hands, our humble offerings become blessings for many. May the Eucharist continually transform us into a people of thanksgiving; grateful in prayer, generous in providing, and confident that God can achieve more with our gifts than we can ever imagine.

IMPORTANT PARISH REMINDERS

The Sacrament of Baptism for Infants

Parents may contact the parish office to arrange for the baptism of their child at least one month in advance. Infant Baptisms are held on the third Sunday of the month at one of our weekend masses. Parents must be registered in Our Lady of Light or the parish they attend and participate in a Baptismal Preparation class.

Religious Education for Children and Youth:

Location and Times: Our Parish Faith Formation program takes place on Sunday mornings, in person this year. For more information, please contact , Deacon Marcial Cordon Director of Faith Formation, at 718 528-1220 or email at dre101269@diobrook.org

Ages and Requirements: Our program welcomes children and youth who are three years old through High School. We accept and prepare children and youth who have not received the Sacraments.

Parental Responsibilities: Our Holy Father, Pope Francis, reminds us in his new General Directory for Catechesis that those being catechized can live their life in a simple and spontaneous way. We are called to accompany each other on a journey toward Christ, with parents/guardians taking the lead for their children. In addition to having an active participation in the faith formation of their children, Parents or Guardians are also expected to attend Mass with their children and to attend parental preparations for Sacraments.

Reception of Sacraments for School Aged Children: Parents who would like for their child to receive the Sacraments must register them in our parish Sacramental Preparation Program. Our Program requires that children attend and prepare for two complete and consecutive academic years prior to the reception of each Sacrament. The Sacraments of Reconciliation and First Holy Communion is received beginning in grade 2 and up. The Sacrament of Confirmation requires attendance and preparation in our 2 year Confirmation Sacramental Preparation program. Confirmation preparation begins in grades 7 & 8. For each of the Sacraments, there is an extra fee, to cover the costs of the ceremonies. For more information, please contact, Deacon Marcial Cordon Director of Religious Education.

Reception of Sacraments for Adults (RCIA): Our Parish offers the RCIA program for those, ages 16 years and older, who are interested in becoming Catholic. It is also for those who have been baptized and in need of receiving the Sacraments of First Eucharist and Confirmation. The Rite of Christian Initiation program is offered year- round and is also available for children ages 8 and older through the Rite of Christian Initiation Adapted for Children program. Please contact Deacon Marcial Cordon , Director of Faith Formation to register or for more information.

Continuing Faith Formation for Adults: Our parish provides opportunities for lifelong faith formation through small faith sharing groups and bible studies. Please check our website, bulletin or contact the Faith Formation Office for more information.

The Sacrament of Marriage

Since Catholic marriage requires a time of preparation, arrangements should begin at least six months before the proposed date of the wedding to allow for the Marriage Preparation Program. Registered, participating and contributing parishioners, not a third party, may contact the parish office to begin the process.

Pastoral Care of the Sick

If you are entering a hospital for surgery, experiencing a prolonged or serious illness, or are very weak due to advancement of age, call the parish office to arrange for the Sacraments of reconciliation, communion and anointing at home. We can also arrange for a Eucharistic Minister to continue to visit you with the Blessed Sacrament. We are here to serve you, please call.

Funerals

The family member or friend handling the funeral arrangements are asked to contact the pastor to arrange a consolation visit from one of the Priests. He will help you with any questions you may have with planning the Wake and Funeral Mass. The Parish wishes to be with you at this moment of need, all other arrangements involving the church must be initiated by the funeral director. Strict adherence to the Roman Catholic Ritual for Funerals will be followed in all parish involved activities..

Proof of Parish Participation

References and proof of parish residency for both civil and religious purposes can only be provided for registered parishioners. Catholic Schools offering a discount for children of parents who are active members of their parish usually require that the family be registered at least six months previously in their home parish. It is also assumed that the children are registered in the religious education program of the home parish.
